

From Pastor Steve's Desk...

(This is the next installment of an ongoing series of articles regarding what we believe, why we believe it, and why it matters. In the United Methodist Church, there is change coming. Within our global denomination, we have some serious divergent views on the authority of scripture, human sexuality, and what that means in the world and in our church. We aren't sure what the changes will look like, but we know that in order to respond to God's call to be the church in the 21st century, the anchor of our doctrinal identity, we need to know what that is. So, I invite you to join me on this journey for God's glory and to build up the church.)

...on doctrine...

Part 15 - Of Speaking in the Congregation in Such a Tongue as the People Understand

At first glance, this entry in the Articles of Religion of the United Methodist Church appears to have something to do with the spiritual manifestation of speaking in tongues as discussed by Paul in 1Corinthians 14. However, for John Wesley and the early Methodists, "speaking in the congregation in such a tongue as the people understand" had more to do with praying, preaching, and talking in English rather than Latin. Latin was the official language of the Roman Catholic Church, which most people did not understand, making worship a passive experience. This is something the early Methodists wanted to ensure was not the case in the churches in the tradition.

Here's what Article of Religion 15 says about this: It is a thing plainly repugnant to the Word of God, and the custom of the primitive church, to have public prayer in the church, or to minister the Sacraments, in a tongue not understood by the people. (From The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church - 2004. Copyright - 2016 by The United Methodist Publishing House.)

John Wesley firmly believed that in order for people to respond to the salvation offered in Jesus Christ, worship, prayer, and the practice of their faith in everyday life must have ownership for the person on the Christian journey. In the churches whose traditions firmly held to using the ancient languages for worship and the administration of the Sacraments, the people, who could not read, write, or understand much of those ancient languages, were left in the dark. Using a language that people understand opened each believer to the pathway of understanding the Gospel message of salvation for themselves and not relying on intermediaries.

Even though, however, this article is about languages used in worship, what about speaking in tongues or Christian-ese (using church words that people don't understand)? Well, because the main conduit for the Good News about Jesus is, was, and always will be, verbal, inter-personal communication, speaking about Jesus in words that the hearer can fully understand would be the foremost method of communication. If I, as the pastor, were to always use long theological words in my sermons, some might not understand - not because they are ignorant, but because they haven't heard of he words (they don't exactly get used a lot). If someone with the spiritual gift of speaking in tongues utters that language in worship as a declaration, then interpretation is needed from within the body for that to edify the church. Without the understanding, the words are lost and the experience becomes confusing. This is exactly what John Wesley and the early Methodists wanted to avoid.

The bottom line for the church today is that there must not be barriers for people to HEAR the Word of God in worship. Whatever we do or say must strive to be accessible to the people who have come to seek after Christ as his followers. Only by personal faith can we come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, by God's grace and the leading of the Holy Spirit. If we do anything by our own deeds that makes that more difficult, it stands in the way of God's grace. Real communication happens best when we are looking someone in the eye, with love and compassion, and speaking the words they truly understand.



Zucchini Casserole

- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1 Tbsp. flaked onion or 3 Tbsp fresh shopped onion
- 1/2 c. Almond Milk
- 2 c. shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 c. zucchini, sliced
- 1. In oven proof skillet over medium heat, melt the butter. Then add garlic and onion and cook until brown and fragrant.
- 2. Add the almond milk and simmer until it starts to boil. Slowly add in 1 c. of shredded cheese and stir until melted.
- 3. Stir in zucchini until all are covered with sauce. Stir and cook for another 5 minutes.

Sprinkle remaining cheeses on top. Bake at 400 in oven until brown (usually another 20 minutes).

Community Helping Hands

I've been on a few mission trips to foreign countries and within the United States. Each trip was meaningful and made an impact on me and I would encourage others to "do" a mission trip. However, there are other options for serving.

Recently, I was asked to take a position at the *Community Helping Hands* organization at the Gateway Center in Jamestown. Most of us have at least heard of CHH - some have given the organization donations of clothing, furniture or miscellaneous items or maybe a monetary donation. CHH uses the donations in their sales rooms and the money earned goes back into the organization to maintain the facilities and pay the limited staff. Many of the donated items are given to individuals and families who are referred to CHH by other agencies and churches. These people may be struggling and have needs that they cannot meet in any other way other than to ask for help. There is a system in place with limits and oversight.

Additionally, *Community Helping Hands* offers jobs to those who are in need of employment to fulfill a requirement for public assistance or who have approached other agencies with a willingness to work. CHH has a staff member who interviews those seeking work, places each person in an appropriate position within the warehouse, sorting rooms, and retail outlets and continuously monitors the workers to ensure their success. The jobs provide opportunities to learn skills, acquire good work habits, and develop social skills. The jobs require folks to learn how to work as a team and how to cultivate relationships. The hope is these individuals will move on to employment outside of CHH.

Besides the limited staff and the workers paid by outside agencies, CHH relies on volunteers. There is a Board of Directors setting policy and guiding the actions of the organization. Volunteers help in all the areas - from the office to the warehouse. Did I mention the sewing room where donated fabric and related sewing materials are turned into items to be sold in the retail shop? If it weren't for the volunteers, the organization couldn't survive.

We cannot all go to foreign countries to do mission trips. But we can help others close to home. The needs in our community are vast and varied. *Community Helping Hands* is a local organization meeting the needs of people who need a Hand UP. Your donations help and your time could help CHH serve more people. A few hours each week - in the office, sewing room, warehouse, Christmas room, sorting room, or retail outlets - would be appreciated. Or, if you want to do a specific project - even a project that can be done at home—we can accommodate that as well.

MISSIONS

Village of Hope Haiti www.villageofhopehaiti.org

Village of Hope (VOH) School is located in the countryside 15 miles east of Port au Prince. The thirty acres of mountainside overlooking the beautiful Haitian county provide VOH with ample room for its school and health center. Many from the PUMC have traveled in work groups to Haiti and helped with the building of the School and the Health Center.

The school has eight buildings that house seventeen classrooms (pre K through secondary), kitchen, dining hall, chapel, showers and toilets, offices and storage. The school offers quality Christian education including a mid-day meal to approximately 640 children.

The Health Center provides access to primary health care not only to the students, staff and teachers at VOH but to their families and community members as well. Primary Health care services included laboratory testing and pharmaceutical services, all provided by Haitian medical professionals. The current staff has the potential to serve more that 50 patients per day.

The VOH ministry of education and health care is literally the hands and feet of Christ for the children at VOH. In the name of Jesus, we are bringing healing and health to God's children in Haiti.

This is one of the ministries that our mission team supports each year. We have sent several mission team to Haiti over the years.
