From Pastor Steve's Desk...

(This is the next installment of an ongoing series of articles regarding what we believe, why we believe it, and why it matters. In the United Methodist Church, there is change coming. Within our global denomination, we have some serious divergent views on the authority of scripture, human sexuality, and what that means in the world and in our church. Later this year, it's anticipated that the UMC will divide into two or more branches. One will be more progressive/liberal and the other more traditional/conservative. We aren't sure what the changes will look like, but we know that in order to respond to God's call to be the church in the 21st century, the anchor of our doctrinal identity, we need to know what that is. So, I invite you to join me on this journey for God's glory and to build up the church.)

Part 22 - Rites and Ceremonies of Churches

For those who have been faithfully following this two-year journey into the beliefs and doctrines of the United Methodist Church, I pray that you've learned something new, or seen something old in a new light. For those who have recently begun to follow this series, the purpose of the series is to help us understand who we are as United Methodists and appreciate the rich tradition and spirituality of our church. One of the ways we express that spirituality and our faith in each local churches to engage in worship and celebration. Sometimes, that worship takes the form of rites and ceremonies in the context of communal worship, which is unique in each time and place.

Here's what Article of Religion 22 says: It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same, or exactly alike; for they have been always different, and may be changed according to the diversity of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word. Whosoever, through his private judgment, willingly and purposely doth openly break the rites and ceremonies of the church to which he belongs, which are not repugnant to the Word of God, and are ordained and approved by common authority; ought to be rebuked openly, that others may fear to do the like, as one that offendeth against the common order of the church and woundeth the consciences of weak brethren.

Every particular church may ordain, change, or abolish rites and ceremonies, so that all things may be done to edification. (From The Book or Discipline of The United Methodist Church - 2016. Copyright 2016 by the United Methodist Publishing House.)

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, developed this Article to state that each local church can determine how and when it engages in worship, rites (such as marriage), and ceremonies (blessings and commissionings, to name two), <u>as long as</u> those do not go against the agreed upon rites and ceremonies of those gathered in that place, or the denomination. This gives the local church an incredible amount of freedom to express its spirituality in many ways, based on the dynamics of the particular church. If done not, however, (Continued on next page)

give the local church the authority to change the doctrine or beliefs of the church to suit its own needs.

This Articles prevents the local church from being required to adhere to a denomination -proscribed set of worship and ceremonial liturgies that sometimes result in dead worship and lack of spirituality. This Article also clearly prevents any pastor or lay member from rejecting the agreed-upon rites and celebrations in the church, going off in a rogue direction, leading others astray.

In the current disagreements in the United Methodist Church, same-sex marriage is the center of the discussion. The current rules prevent any clergy from performing same-sex weddings or churches from hosting same-sex weddings. The current language in the Book of Discipline also prevents the ordination of practicing homosexual persons. Unfortunately, some churches and conferences have done just those, which is not in adherence to Article 22. The anticipated denominational split is a disagreement in the authority of Scripture and rules more than these two specific examples.

I am thankful for the rich traditions of the Church. I am equally thankful that we are part of a denomination that encourages creative expressions of authentic spirituality and celebrations within the framework of our Wesleyan perspective. As we join together to celebrate how Christ is alive and moving in our midst, enjoy it!

Lenten Devotionals

Ash Wednesday Worship

On Wednesday, February 26th, we will kick-off the season that leads to Easter (April 12) by worshipping. This day is known as Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent. It falls 40 weekdays before Easter (Sundays aren't counted in the 40 days of Lent). Ash Wednesday takes its name from ashes, a traditional Jewish sign of penitence. In some traditions, palm fronds or palm crosses from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burned, and then the ashes are applied to the worshiper's forehead on Ash Wednesday as a token of their commitment to observe a "holy Lent".

Ancient Christian tradition was to observe Lent with fasting (a discipline of going without food at certain times), study, self-examination, confession and prayer. During this time, candidates for Holy Baptism were prepared for baptism on Easter Eve. Many churches continue those traditions.

VILLAGE OF HOPE

After several months of delays, we finally arrived in Haiti on January 3, 2020. We were a little nervous about being here as we were not really sure what we would be walking into relative to the peace and security of the country. As it turns out, we will be safe as long as we stay away from certain areas and travel with the appropriate level of security. This is so different for us as we used to be able to get in our vehicles and go anywhere with no problems other than the usual traffic delays and crowded streets.

We have been to the School and Health Center twice. There is heavy gang activity on the road to there so we can only go when Clovis, the School Principal, is able to arrange a police escort. Despite that, the teachers and health center staff have been managing to get to work since December. They are a truly dedicated group of workers.

We have met our replacement, Maryse Sterlin. She is a Haitian who lived in the US; she went to high school and college (Adelphi University) in New York. She has experience working with non-profits in Haiti. She will be an asset as she is well versed in American and Haitian culture. We start working together on the first of February.

Later in February, we will introduce Maryse to the VOH board at a meeting in Florida. The meeting was supposed to be held here but the board is reluctant to travel here as travel insurance is not available for teams. This means that short term mission teams aren't coming either for the time being. We will learn at that meeting how long our services will be needed as well.

Our internet has been down more than usual which means we missed the live stream of church this past week. We will have to watch it now that our service has been restored.

We thank you for your prayers and ask that you continue to pray for us and for Village of Hope. Pray for peace and stability in Haiti.
